FAQ: Maine's Wild Rockweed Industry

Why is wild Maine rockweed targeted by industry?

Wild Maine rockweed is processed into fertilizers, farm animal supplements, pet food, and cosmetics.

How is wild Maine rockweed cut and removed?

Most rockweed is cut from boats floating above the underwater rockweed forest.

Rockweed grows slowly yet can be farmed (according to the Maine Seaweed Council¹). Edible farmed kelp grows 2-3 inches a day².

Rockweed grows back after cutting as little as 1-3 inches in a year³).

Cutting Methods

Method: Raking cutting

- 20 foot boats, 1-2 persons in each boat, max 6 tons/tide (observed)
- Cutting: rake is dragged over floating rockweed. A cutter blade inside the rake slices the rockweed. Rockweed caught on the rake is flipped into the boat.

Method: Machine cutting

- Cutting nozzle on the front of the boat, max 17 tons/tide (obs.)
- Cutting action: Large nozzle with rotating blades chops the rockweed forest. As bags fill with chopped rockweed (and snails), they are dropped off at a collection point.
- ~15-35 ton bags of rockweed are collected, then loaded on a truck or boat and taken to the processing factory (obs).

What are the laws and regulations for cutting wild Maine rockweed? Statewide rules:

- Must have a license, leave 16" of the rockweed plant (illegal to remove whole plants).4
- No limit to how much rockweed can be cut, when it can be cut, and where it can be cut.
- As of 2019: Rockweed can only be cut on intertidal lands where owner permission has been obtained.

State law for Cobscook Bay only:

Assigned sectors, max. of 17% rockweed biomass cut/year / sector, "no cut" conservation areas

Who enforces the rockweed cutting laws/rules?

Maine Department of Marine Resources, Marine Patrol enforces these laws/rules.

The **requirement** for those cutting rockweed to get permission first from landowners is frequently violated (as reported by landowners).

The MRC website list steps if landowners believe their **rockweed has been stolen**.
